PARKER, Dorothea. Douglas, Jan. 23 – (AP) – Mrs. Dorothea Packard Parker, youngest daughter of the late Col. B. A. Packard, pioneer Cochise county banker, cattleman and legislator, died here last night after an illness of nearly two years. She was graduated from Marlborough School for Girls at Los angeles and in 1918 was married to Maj. John Archibald Parker, who was killed March 19, 1933, at Petersburg, Va., while on a government mission. Since her husband's death, Mrs. Parker had resided in Douglas and for many years was employed at the Valley National Bank, formerly the First National Bank of Douglas, of which her late father was at one time president. Mrs. Parker is survived by her mother, Mrs. B. A. Packard, with whom she had made her home; a sister-in-law, Mrs. Ashley B. Packard, of Douglas; two nephews, Lt. Col. Ashley B. Packard, jr., of Chico, Calif., and Burdette A. Cottrell, in the government service in New York City, and a niece, Mrs. Louise Cottrell Henness, of Tempe. PARKER, Sofia Ida Carlson June 1, 1917. Pioneer Woman Dies. Mrs. Bert G. Parker died Tuesday morning about 1:30 o'clock. Mrs. Parker was born in Stockholm, the capital of Sweden, June 9, 1856. She came to America in 1892, first locating in San Francisco and after residing in that city for five years moved to Los Angeles and then to Santa Barbara, coming to Willcox in 1898 and going direct to Hooker's Ranch. She was married to Mr. Parker on October 17, 1900. W.F. Nichols performed the ceremony, which took place in Willcox where Mrs. Parker continually resided until the time of her death. Her maiden name was Sofia Ida Carlson. Previous to her marriage and while in her native country she gained considerable prominence as an expert cook, at one time holding a responsible position in the household of the doctor to the King of Sweden. She was also a linguist of quite distinguished ability, speaking seven languages. Mrs. Parker was a semi-invalid for the past ten years and suffered from valvular heart trouble. Six years ago an operation gave temporary relief and she was in fair health up until last January when she contracted a severe case of gripp. This was followed by a dropsical condition which finally caused her death. As one of the pioneer women of Willcox, Mrs. Parker was widely known and leaves many friends besides a bereaved husband to mourn her. The funeral services were held at the family residence Tuesday afternoon at four o'clock, Rev. E.H. Nicholson officiating. Many beautiful floral pieces, the gifts of loving friends, were in evidence. PAVENTE, Angelo. April 5, 1944. Cochise Mining Man Taken by Heart Attack. Angelo Pavente, 65 year old mining man who had lived in Arizona for 40 years and in Cochise County for the past 30 years, died suddenly of a heart attack in Douglas yesterday. His home was in the small community of Cochise, northeast of here. Mr. Pavente was stricken while he and Mr. and Mrs. Sam Hayhurst old time friends, were visiting at the home of Mrs. E.K. Hanson, 740 E. avenue. He had not complained of feeling ill and his death came as a shock to his friends and relatives. Judge F.L. Stewart, local coroner was called to the Hanson home, arriving there shortly after Dr. Atonna made an examination and pronounced death due to heart disease. Mr. Pavente was born in Bagno Grande Abbruzi, Italy, October 6, 1878, the son of Amedo Pavente. As a youth he went to Germany and from there came to the United States. From New York City he went to Colorado, where he worked in the mines for one year before coming to Arizona. For several years he was a mine foreman at the Republic mine at Dragoon. Less than one year ago he retired. He is survived by his wife, Margaret, by one daughter, Mary Pavente, of Cochise, and two stepsons, Lt. Reno Zambonini, in the armed forces, and Bert Zambonini, of Cochise. Funeral services will be held at Cochise at 6 o'clock Thursday evening with burial in the Cochise cemetery. PEREZ, Joseph L. August 28, 1963. Local Man Killed Walking on Hiway. Jose L. Perez, 53, 101 Canyon Drive, Sierra Vista, was killed Sunday night when struck by two station wagons while walking west in the westbound lane on highway 80 eight miles west of Douglas. A coronor's jury Monday exonerated the two motorists whose vehicles struck the victim. Highway patrolmen reported that one car, driven by Robert Aguilar of Sierra Vista, struck Perez and moments later a second car driven by Reyes Mendoza of Douglas, also ran into the victim. Justice of the Peace L.T. Frazier presided over the inquest and said the point of impact of Perez with the Aguilar vehicle indicated Perez was walking too far from the road shoulder and was wearing dark clothing, making it difficult to see him. PEREZ, Santiago. January 5, 1939. Santiago Perez Is Victim of Accident at the Empire Mine Thursday Morning. Santiago Perez, 22, native of Tombstone was accidentally killed last Thursday morning at the Empire mine, where he and his father, Felix Perez, and a brother, Pete, were going to work on a lease from the Tombstone Development Co. It was testified at the coroner's inquest Thursday afternoon that Santiago stepped on a platform over the shaft at their workings, and that the platform gave way, dropping Perez approximately 50 feet where we was covered with muck. Mr. Perez testified that he was just warning his son that he was afraid of the platform when it went down. The accident happened on the 30..(?) Foot level and rescue workers recovered the body from the 400-foot level which was the only way it could be accomplished safely. Thursday's accident was the first in the Empire mine and the first in Tombstone since 1932 when one man was killed at the Extension. The funeral services were held on Friday afternoon at the city cemetery with Rev. Winthrop M. Mager officiating. It was estimated that over 200 friends of the popular young man gathered to pay a last tribute to him. Pallbearers were Joe Maldonado, Ralph Maldonado, Urbano Valerio, Peter Ornedas, Ignacio Montijo, G.....vino Ramerize. Santiago Perez was a graduate of the local grammar school and of Tombstone Union high school. He received his high school diploma with the class of 1937. He was to have entered college at Flagstaff after the holidays. At high school Santiago was a noted athlete as are his brothers. He is survived by his mother and father, Mr. and Mrs. Felix Perez, three brothers, Fernando, Pete, and Ben; four sisters, Belin, Carmelia, Etolia, and Antonia. PYEATT, Mary. December 22, 1949. Pioneer Ranch Woman Dies; Last Rites Held At Canille. Fought Indians In Early Days; Was Personal Friend of Clanton Boys. Mrs. Mary Pyeatt, 79, one of the last rancher pioneers of the Huachuca area, died early Sunday morning at the Rest Home where she had been a patient about six months. While never living in Tombstone during the active years of her life, she was intimately acquainted with parts of its history. Born in San Antonio, Texas, she came to Tombstone in 1880 and settled first in Brown's Canyon, where she lived for two years. At that time she moved to what is now the Pyeatt ranch just over the Huachuca mountains. In 1887 she married Henry Pyeatt in Charleston. Her husband died in March 1942. "Grandma" Pyeatt, as she was affectionately known by her family and friends, knew much of the hardships of frontier life. More than one time she had to do her share of the fighting in warding off attacking Apache marauders, who at the time made life miserable for all ranchers in the mountain areas. She was a personal friend of the Clantons and spoke highly of the young men who were killed in the famous OK Corral gun battle. Until the last few years, Mrs. Pyeatt took an active part in the management of the ranch, but failing health forced her to move to town some months ago where she could have a doctor's care. Funeral services were held today (Wed.) at 1:30 at Black Oak Cemetery at Canille. Surviving are five sons, Seth of Florence; Lon and Irvin of Tombstone; Buster of Canille and Russell of Nogales; two daughters, Mrs. Gilbert Hanley, Bisbee and Mrs. Luella Cooper, Tucson; and one brother, Dave Kenny of Texas. She leaves 33 grandchildren and 21 great-grandchildren. A son, Joe Pyeatt, and a daughter, Mrs. Ozella Kooger, preceded her in death. Pallbearers were Fred Bennett, John Giacoma, and W.A.
